RE: BATTLEGROUND REPORT: Republicans are Serving Price Spikes This Thanksgiving

As families across the country prepare to gather around the table this Thanksgiving, they are facing high costs on holiday essentials thanks to Senate Republicans' toxic, price-spiking agenda – which is backed by every single GOP Senate candidate.

"Americans are paying more and getting less this Thanksgiving thanks to Republicans' toxic agenda and their refusal to address the affordability crisis," **said Democratic Senatorial Campaign Committee spokesperson Maeve Coyle.** "Their reckless policies have created uncertainty for millions of families who are now struggling to keep up with skyrocketing costs on everything from electricity to their holiday dinner, and in 2026, voters will reject the Republican Senate candidates who back these harmful price spikes."

Here are the facts about the Republican affordability crisis, how it's impacting American families this Thanksgiving, and how Republican Senate candidates in battleground states are supporting policies that increase costs.

REPUBLICANS ARE SERVING PRICE SPIKES THIS THANKSGIVING:

- Thanksgiving dinner overall: This year, the price of groceries for a typical full Thanksgiving meal is approximately \$140.25 (nearly 10 percent higher than last year, and three times the current rate of inflation).
- **Turkey:** The wholesale price of frozen turkeys is <u>up nearly 40 percent</u> compared to last year.
- **Ham:** The price of an 8-pound bone-in spiral ham is <u>up nearly 50 percent</u> compared to last year.
- **Squash:** The price of a 3-pound butternut squash is <u>up nearly 13 percent</u> compared to last year.
- **Onions:** The price of a 1 lb bag of sweet onions is <u>up 56 percent</u> compared to last year, while the price of a canister of fried onions is up <u>15.16 percent</u>.
- Yams: The price of a single can of McCall Farms canned yams is <u>up 8.51 percent</u> compared to last year.
- **Cheese:** The price of two bags of shredded Sargento cheese is <u>up 13.64 percent</u> compared to last year.
- Pasta: The price of a single box of De Cecco elbow pasta is <u>up 16.27 percent</u> compared to last year.
- **Cranberries:** The price of a single can of Ocean Spray cranberry sauce is <u>up 22.25</u> <u>percent</u> compared to last year.
- **Potatoes:** The price of a single box of Idahoan Foods mashed potatoes is <u>up nearly 5</u> <u>percent</u> compared to last year.



- **Gravy:** The price of a single packet of McCormick turkey gravy mix is <u>up 7.36 percent</u> compared to last year.
- Pie Crusts: The price of two packs of refrigerated pie crusts is <u>up 12.68 percent</u> compared to last year
- Pecans: The price of 12 ounces of pecans is up 11.22 percent compared to last year.
- **Apples:** The price of 3 pounds of Honeycrisp apples is <u>up 8.23 percent</u> compared to last year.
- Aluminum Foil: The price of Reynolds Wrap Heavy Duty Aluminum Foil is <u>up nearly 40</u> <u>percent</u> compared to last year.
- **Travel:** The price of airline fares is up <u>3.2 percent</u> compared to the same time last year.

AMERICANS ARE REJECTING REPUBLICANS' HIGHER PRICES:

 - "Americans are worried about the cost of basic needs including healthcare, food, housing and energy, a Reuters/Ipsos poll found, suggesting those concerns could be critical in next year's midterm elections that will determine control of the U.S. Congress."

 - "Some 76% of voters view the economy negatively. That's worse than the 67% who felt that way in July and the 70% who said the same at the end of former President Biden's term."
 - "Voters blame the president. About twice as many say President Donald Trump, rather than Biden, is responsible for the current economy. And three times as many say Trump's economic policies have hurt them (they said the same about Biden's last year). Plus, approval of how Trump is handling the economy hit a new low, and disapproval of his overall job performance hit record highs among core supporters."

 - "America's middle class—once a core pillar of Donald Trump's political coalition—is showing signs of breaking away as frustration over living costs intensifies, according to new polling and economic data."
 - "YouGov/Economist polling over the past three months shows a clear downward trend in Trump's standing with middle-class Americans. In September, the group split 44 percent approval to 54 percent disapproval (-10). By October, approval slipped to 42 percent and disapproval reached 53 percent (-11). The latest November numbers show a sharper deterioration: just 40 percent approve of Trump's performance, while 58 percent disapprove—a steep net decline of 18 points."
