Pfizer savs shot is safe for young children

Early vaccine data shows 80 percent efficacy for those under 5 years old

Pfizer and its German partner, BioNTech, said Monday that an early analysis showed their three-dose coronavirus vaccine regimen triggered a strong im une response in younger chil en, proving 80 percent effec tive at preventing symptomatic infections in children 6 month to 4 years old.

The results, along with other recent developments, signal that the long and frustrating wait for a vaccine for the youngest chil dren, the last group to lack access, could be over within weeks.

The Food and Drug Adminis tration, in an announcement a few hours after Pfizer and BioN-Tech issued a news release about their results, said the agency's outside experts are scheduled to meet June 15 to discuss the Pfiner-BioNTech vaccine and an-other shot for the youngest chil-dren from the biotechnology

company Moderna.

If the FDA advisory panel looks favorably on the pediatric vaccines, the agency could an thorize the shots as soon as June 16 or 17. Vaccine advisers to the Centers for Disease Control and
