## Elon Musk's Twitter Flip-Flop Cues Up Strange Legal Fight

Elon Musk's showdown with Twitter Inc. has set the stage for what could become one of the most unusual courtroom battles in corporate-takeover history—a spurned acquisition target that never sought to be bought poten tially trying to force the buyer

In just over three months, Mr. Musk aggressively pursued a takeover that Twitter first resisted, then he prevailed and reneged-all the while using the very platform to ridicule Twitter and its leaders and drop hints about his shifting

terminate his \$44 billion takeover, Twitter says it plans le-gal action. In a statement Friday, it indicated it will file a lawsuit in the Delaware Court of Chancery arguing Mr. Musk must close the agreed-upon

Friday evening, he filed pa-pers saying he wanted out, taking aim at Twitter on several fronts and saving the company violated the merger agreement. ### Inflation Looms Over **Earnings** Season

JPMorgan, Pepsi, Delta to report results this week: some investors fear forecasts too rosy

Investors expect concerns out hot inflation and strapped consumers to dominate the corporate-earnings season that kicks off this week, creating winners and losers in the battered stock market.

Stocks have come under pressure this year with infla-tion hovering at a four-decade high and the Federal Reserve ingh and the Federal Reserve in the midst of a campaign to raise interest rates to rein it in. The S&P 500 has fallen 18% in 2022, even after rallying 3% to start July.

Tightening monetary policy has slashed the rich valuations that stocks carried at the start of the year, leaving earnings growth as a key pillar of supprovided as a key pillar of sup-port. The reporting season for the second quarter will mark the latest test for the market as investors assess how prof-its have held up—and how companies are navigating the second half of the year.
