On behalf of the Educational Freedom Institute, we recently conducted a Texas statewide survey of N=600 Republican primary voters, May 27-28, 2025 (<u>+</u> 4%). This survey was conducted via a mixed mode methodology of live callers and text-to-web to cell phones with a sample selected from the Texas voter file with GOP primary vote history.

KEY FINDINGS

- A strong majority of Texas Republicans are pessimistic about the direction of public schools. By a 57%-25% margin, Texas Republicans believe K-12 public schools in the state are "off on the wrong track" rather than "headed in the right direction."
 - GOP primary voters believe "Texas parents should be able to have a choice in where and how their children are educated" (94% agree-5% disagree), and "Texas parents, not the government, should be allowed to choose the best education environment for their children" (94% agree-6% disagree).
 - By an 86%-12% margin, Texas GOP primary voters support "stopping the promotion of gender ideology teachings, including the concept there are more than two genders, to elementary school children in Texas public schools." There's also strong support (95% support-4% oppose) for "banning ideological boys from participating in girls' sports in Texas public schools to protect girls' sports."
- Nearly 80% of Texas Republican primary voters support school choice and the expansion of charter schools. GOP primary voters (79% support-15% oppose) strongly support giving Texas parents a choice in where they send their kids to school by expanding charter schools in the state:

More than two-thirds of Texas GOP primary voters strongly support ESAs. By a 69%-22% margin, a strong majority of Republican primary voters in Texas support "Education Savings Accounts, or ESAs, to create more education opportunities and choice for Texas families. This program provides approximately \$10,000 per year for parents who opt out of K-12 public schools and choose to use that money instead for private school tuition, online education programs, tutoring, textbooks or other instructional materials, and therapies for students with special needs."

- By more than a two-to-one margin, GOP primary voters support expanding ESAs to all families who apply. After being given some information that "the Education Savings Account program is currently capped at 100,000 students, which is approximately 2% of the school-aged population in Texas," voters support expanding funding to cover all families who apply 62%-27%. Texas GOP primary parents support an expansion of ESAs by a 60%-31% margin.
- Texas Republicans can benefit electorally in future GOP primary campaigns by supporting both school choice and ESAs. Fully 57% of GOP primary voters say they would be "more likely" to vote for a Republican candidate who supports school choice and expanding the number of charter schools in Texas. Only 13% say they would be "less likely" and 24% say it would "make no difference" in their vote.



THE TEXAS GOP POLITICAL LANDSCAPE

Most Republicans tested in the survey are very popular among Texas GOP primary voters.

 Thinking ahead to next year's GOP primary election, Governor Abbott is in a much stronger position for re-nomination than Senator Cornyn. By a 64%-27% margin, a majority of Texas GOP primary voters believe "the Governor has done a good enough job to deserve re-election" rather than "it is time for a new Republican to be elected Governor."

On the other hand, when it comes to Cornyn, a majority (54%) of GOP primary voters believe "*it is time for a new Republican to be elected U.S. Senator*" compared with 27% who say, "*the U.S. Senator has done a good enough job to deserve re-election*."

- While the 2026 GOP primary continues to be a long way off, John Cornyn currently trails Ken Paxton in a head-to-head race by more than 20 points. In a one-on-one trial heat, Paxton leads Cornyn 50%-28% among GOP primary voters. Paxton currently leads Cornyn among very conservative GOP primary voters (60%-22%), high propensity 3/3 GOP primary voters (57%-27%), MAGA voters (58%-23%), Seniors (47%-35%), as well as among voters across every media market in the state.
- Cornyn loses even more ground on an informed ballot test. In an effort to "fast forward" the race among voters in our survey, voters were given a second ballot test after having them assume that A.) President Trump would endorse John Cornyn; B.) Paxton would attack Cornyn for his past comments on Trump, saying that Trump's "time has passed him by"; and, C.) Paxton would attack Cornyn for, in the past, siding with Democrats on a gun control bill. Following this information, Paxton's lead over Cornyn widens to 62%-21%.
