Dear Colleagues,

I met with President Biden and he accepted that my time as Labor Secretary will conclude mid-March. I told the President how profoundly grateful I am for the opportunity to serve. As someone who grew up in an active union family and is a card-carrying union member, serving as Secretary of Labor and being given this unique opportunity to help working people is itself a privilege. We demonstrated the power of collective bargaining and the importance of labor-management collaboration to build the top-notch workforce that employers and our economy need, and to rebuild a strong, secure and inclusive middle class for our nation's families.

We brought high-quality, equitable job training and career pathways to more workers in more places and across more industries, and we made sure that the federal government's investments are creating good jobs with equitable access for the workers who need them the most. We mobilized to create opportunities in new and emerging sectors in response to critical needs.

Thanks once again to this President's leadership, the rights and needs of working people are no longer the sole concern of the Department of Labor but have been centered in the work of an entire Administration as never before.

In closing this chapter, I would be remiss if I did not also acknowledge the exceptional work and support of my partner in this endeavor, Deputy Secretary **Julie Su**. Julie is an incredible leader and has been central to our success as a team and as a Department. With the kind of leadership and talent assembled across the Department, I am confident there will be continuity and the work will be sustained.

I believe in the work of every single one of the Department's agencies, offices, regions, and people, because I have seen how each of you is making a difference in the lives of those we serve. Our work is at the heart of the President's success building an economy from the bottom up and the middle out, and it will continue to be.

I leave the Department with a deeper understanding of why working people are the heart and soul and strength of our nation. In my travels across this country, I have been moved and inspired by workers,

students, and apprentices at every kind of job. As the son of immigrants, I believe in America more than ever, now that I have had the opportunity to serve our people alongside all of you.
